***A Guide to the Behavior of Common Birds, Volumes II, III, and I.*** Donald W. Stokes and Lillian Q. Stokes. Little, Brown, and Company.

Each volume in this series features 25 different birds and quick summaries of their behavior throughout the seasons of the year. Visual displays and auditory displays are illustrated with short descriptions. Territorial behavior, courtship, nest building, breeding, plumage changes, seasonal movements and social behavior are given for familiar birds that can be easily observed. The first volume features birds that are more easily seen and observed.

***Tracking and the Art of Seeing: How to Read Animal Tracks and Signs.*** Paul Rezendes. 1987.

This guide by a nature photographer features color photographs of animal tracks and sign in different situations and on different surfaces.

***Tom Brown's Field Guide to Nature Observation and Tracking.*** Tom Brown, Jr. and Brandt Morgan. 1988.

This guide goes into the details of analyzing animal tracks and signs to read the animals' behavior.

***Field Guide to Mammal Tracking in North America.*** James Halfpenny. 1988.

This guide shows various patterns, gaits, signs and scats of North American wildlife.

***Stokes Guide to Animal Tracking and Behavior.*** Donald W. Stokes and Lillian Q. Stokes. 1987.

The authors use drawings of common animal tracks to provide easy identification and analysis.

***Essentials of Animal Behavior (Studies in Biology) Second edition.*** P.J.B. Slater. 1999.

This text focuses on the history and basic concepts of animal behavior study.

***Measuring Behavior: An Introductory Guide. Second edition.*** Paul Martin and Patrick Bateson. 1993.

This textbook, written for university students doing animal behavioral studies, provides the essential design elements for scientific research, proper selection of methodologies and sample sizes, as well as data collection and analysis.

***My Life with the Chimpanzees.*** Jane Goodall. 1988.

This autobiography focuses on Jane's path from childhood to a remote wilderness in Tanzania, where she relates her scientific discoveries with chimpanzees over three decades and discusses their impact on our understanding of animal behavior.

***In the Shadow of Man.*** Jane Goodall. 1970.

This book relates how Jane Goodall's studies of individuals and groups at Gombe Reserve led to the discovery of toolmaking, intraspecies aggression, pronating abilities and other previously unobserved social behavior in chimpanzees. See also the sequel.
